Staffing at the Boyle River Outdoor Education Centre

Sometimes it is hard to know who is who so we thought here is a quick overview of the staffing at the Centre.

We have a board compromising of nine people many who are connected to Rotary and schools who have a long history with the Centre.

We currently have a Centre Manager and an Operations Manager who are leading the push to develop and organise things on the ground to ensure camps and groups are informed and run smoothly.

We have a maintenance manager and a chef who specialises in dietary and plant based foods and a raft of employees who come on for programmes from as far afield as Nelson but most come from Christchurch.

Many of the staff live off site and travel to the Centre each week. This shows true dedication to working with us, they spend more time here than in their own beds.

We have an administrator/warden who oversees our Te Araroa and tramping services and assists in the office. Traditionally a temporary position that we hope to make more permanent.



### Centre Manager

Centre Manager Sharon Nicholas joined The Boyle, in Mid April after a stint at Wellington City Council. She has spent more than 20 years working in Outdoor Education and guiding roles including nine years at Outward Bound NZ, three years designing and delivering experiential leadership for the NZ police, and multiple years managing and contracting in the Polytechnics teaching technical outdoor skills.

Sharon has also guided in the polar regions and assesses instructors for the NZ Outdoor Instructors Association.



Operations Manager

Operations Manager Julian Wright hales from Kenya.

Julian moved to NZ with his wife and young family at the start of 2024 and is currently based in Christchurch. Julian worked as a guide and educator in Kenya before running a climbing gym and then starting his own business 'African Ascents' a successful guiding company taking people up Mt Kenya and Kilimanjaro. Julian is an experienced outdoorsman specializing in alpine, bush and climbing as well as dealing with wild animals somewhat similar to teenagers!



### Communities

In 2025 we are currently scheduled to be hosting 28 schools and universities and working alongside or running programmes for at least another 10 organisations or Boyle River managed programmes.

This year as well as the Kura Kaupapa who have come onboard we are also working with the Hurunui District Council to run leadership development programmes for the Youth Council and Potential leaders as well as Haemophilia NZ



We are aiming to run More Duke of Edinburgh Award Adventurous Journeys next year and are in conversations with other youth organisations about weekend based programmes.

If you know of other organisations or corporates who may be interested in some team building or leadership development you can assist us to share the word that we are open to hearing from them and custom designing something that suits. Our greatest gaps are in August.



### Belfast-Kaiapoi Rotary

Belfast-Kaiaopi Rotary have been amazing supporters coming to assist us when we needed to clear out the sewage holding tanks but also visiting to see what else can be done.

We would like to recognise Tony Cox and Family who enabled the insulation of the staff house and storage boxes for food and Sean Roscoe who has been working on some behind the scenes tasks.

Reigniting the relationship with our founding Rotary and keeping it going is so important to our future and we can't thank you enough for your ongoing support.



### Rangiora Rotary

Another long term supporter/ founder of the Centre; Rangiora Rotary brought a bus load of their team up for a visit and tour earlier this year. It was great to have them onsite. Members organised a trailer load of wood to keep the staff fire burning through winter and have worked with Michael Ermerins to supply doors for the showers in the student accommodation. Rangiora Rotary made a decision to support the Centre financially which has enabled us in quieter times this year to tick along and we are greatly appreciative of the support.



Rotary Leadership Camp

We want to recognise the Rotary groups who supported youth to attend a leadership camp this year.

We run this camp in late September every year. This year we saw 19 students attend from as far afield as Nelson and Ashburton as well as the West Coast and Christchurch.

We aim to let everyone know about the programme earlier next year as both schools and participants have found it to be hugely rewarding.

### Projects: Boyle River

As we move into 2025 we have a number of projects launching and in need.

#### Sponsor the Boyle / Sponsor a School

We are working with schools to fundraise for them and the Centre.

We are sending out flyers which you can see on the following pages and accompanying letters explaining the fundraiser.

These are then sent out by schools to their alumni and local organisations to gain sponsorship for their school camp.

By engaging with our schools and communities we hope to decrease the pressure on them and families, and enable all youth to attend their camp.

#### **Upgrades to the High Ropes Course**

This year we have been supported by the EB Milton Trust to complete our annual audit and to carry out maintenance on our high ropes courses.

The High Ropes is a key feature of camps and gets almost daily use when groups are in. It is an iconic and impactful activity and one that is often a highlight for participants. It can be fun, challenging and provide areas of teamwork, leadership and overall growth.

We are hoping to complete an upgrade to allow more use of this activity that is a key highlight of those who cross the cattlestop to the Boyle.

The cost of the upgrade is going to be around \$30,000.



### More on the Projects at the Boyle

#### Staff and Student accommodation

We are constantly amazed by the numbers of people who have been to the Centre, we meet them everywhere and we need them now!

Our staff are the heart and soul of the organisation, students remember their time and activities but they love and rave about their instructors.

Instructors work tirelessly to ensure programmes run smoothly often starting their days early and finishing late or being out multiple nights with their students. It is imperative that we remain safe and like anyone our staff can get back to a warm bed and a solid sleep.

In 2025 we need to renovate the staff accommodation.

It is the simple things that matter and sharing a room is not an issue for our team but when we are busy and our team doesn't need too, then having a space of their own after a difficult day is a luxury.

We are looking for sponsorship to build a new wing and renovate what is there turning a three bedroom house into a 6 bedroom house.

Currently we can accommodates 7 staff in 3 rooms and hope to accommodate up to 12 with a kitchen and bathroom that is user friendly.

Accommodation is a barrier for staff here at the Boyle and we are lucky to always attract capable, passionate people.

By completing a renovation of the accommodation we will ensure that we continue to look after the team, attract and retain great staff and future proof the organisation for the next 50 years.

Renovating the current accommodation is not an option but a necessity.

We have architectural concept designs done and an experienced architect ready to complete plans but we are looking for support for building and concessions.

The estimated costs be will around \$200,000.



Student Accommodation

Upgrading the student accommodation has been on the radar for a while now. Our aim is to fundraise for this as an ongoing project that we hope to complete before our 50th Anniversary celebrations.

Imagine opening the new accommodation at the 50th!

The current building has done well to withstand the battering of teenagers over 50 years.

We have many requests for camps that overlap and as a result turn groups away in our busiest times.

This means many miss out on the opportunity to visit our Centre and potentially miss out on a school camp.

The aim of the new building is to provide more accommodation to more groups and be able to operate concurrently. Drawings have already been rendered and this project will be iconic at enabling us to be the pinnacle of outdoor education for the next 50 years.

As this is a long term project we are seeking interest from individuals and or organisations who may be interested in helping

Clothing and Equipment

Outdoor Safety equipment and clothing is a constant process of repair and replace. As are operational and facility costs.

Looking ahead on our schedule we will be applying for funding to replace

**Radios** - Required for communicating regularly in our area that has no cell coverage.

Cost \$\$1000 per radio

**Abseil anchors** 2 new anchors to be made **Cost \$575 each (approx)** 

**Raincoats and over trousers -** Multiple required to withstand rough handling and rough weather

**Thermals -** Multiple required of various sizes

**Gloves -** Sounds so simple but fleece or polypro gloves are in high demand throughout the year and disappear like socks.

**Dryer -** Required for Lodge and staff house currently there is no way to dry other than air drying to manage multiple turn overs of clothing.



### General operations

It is always harder to obtain funding for operational costs, we can have all the gear and buildings in the world but without funds to pay the power and insurance we would still close. Just another way you can help.

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
